Magic Taxi Tour - 12th September 2025



The Master and Mistress attended the morning breakfast and start of this unique weekend. One of London's most unique annual charity events, the Magical Taxi Tour sees a convoy of licensed London taxis take over 200 children, suffering from a range of chronic, debilitating illnesses and life-limiting conditions, on a three-day trip of a lifetime to Disney Paris. This event has brought moments of great joy and happiness to many children. The amazing convoy reaches over three miles long, and consists of more than 90 taxis, escorts from the City of London Police and Gendarmerie Nationale, London Ambulance NHS Trust vehicles and the AA.



Organised annually by the Worshipful Company of Hackney Carriage Drivers, the event is only possible with the generous support of private donors and sponsors. They contribute the £1,500 per taxi needed to feed, transport and admit the convoy to Disneyland Paris.

The taxi drivers give their time and use of their vehicles for free. Everyone on the trip is a volunteer.

The trip starts from Canary Wharf, where we entertain and feed the children and helpers with the 'Big breakfast' before the giant convoy departs to catch the ferry at Dover.

Election of the Lord Mayor – 29th September 2025

The Lord Mayor is elected by members of the City's ancient trade guilds – Livery Companies who gather at Common Hall in the Guildhall. Dame Susan Langley DBE was elected as the 697th Lord Mayor of London and will be the first to use the title of 'Lady Mayor'. She will champion a 'Modern Mayoralty' with a long-term strategy to drive economic growth in partnership with Government and industry.

We gathered once again at Mansion House for the Annual Banquet. Music supplied by the Royal Marines, Wines sponsored by The Glass and Glazing Federation (GGF). In attendance, the Lord Mayor Locum Tenens, Sir Charles Bowman, and Company guests, including Gp Capt. John Lawson and Mrs Lawson, a delegation from RAF Leeming and HMS Artful, Luxembourg Ambassador to London H.E. Georges Friden, Master Spectacle Maker and Clerk, Master Distiller, and Members from the GGF. Table flowers were supplied by Beards & Daisies.





The Master and a delegation of Glass Sellers attended the Silent Ceremony and the Presentation of Addresses, two ceremonies which start the New Lord (Lady) Mayor's Year of office.

The Silent Ceremony is the occasion upon which the new Lord Mayor of London is sworn into office, and it takes place on the day before the Lord Mayor's Show (which is usually the second Saturday in November).

As the name implies, the actions of all the participants are performed in total silence apart from the swearing of the oath. A procession of richly dressed liverymen and officials, the removal of the outgoing Mayor's tricorn hat and the donning of that of the new, and the presentation of the various symbols of office to the new Mayor. These include the sceptre, sword and badges and all are offered with a bow from their respective officers. The party then leave, also in silence.

There then followed the presentation of addresses at which the Livery Companies present gifts. This year, the new Lady Mayor is Dame Susan Langley DBE. A delegation from the Glass Sellers presented the Lady Mayor with a pair of glass oil & vinegar bottles engraved with the Lady Mayor's Crest and the Glass Sellers' Coat of Arms. The bottles had been created by Past Master David Wilkinson's Company and were from the glass batch used for similar bottles presented to the King for the Coronation. After a short reception, the delegation proceeded to St Laurance Jewry for Evensong.
