

**Answers:**

1. Henry Moore; the stone was carved from the same Carrara quarry used by Michelangelo.
2. It was the first classical dome built in England and served as Wren's direct prototype for the dome of St Paul's Cathedral.
3. The Samaritans, founded by the Reverend Chad Varah, who began the charity's telephone crisis service from within these walls.
4. Nicholas Hawksmoor; when the City and South London Railway was built beneath it in the 1890s the crypt was sold to the railway company and the church reinforced with steel girders at the company's expense, making the church simultaneously a listed building and the structural ceiling of the underground line.
5. Amazing Grace; Newton had been a captain of slave ships before his conversion to evangelical Christianity.
6. The Waste Land; Eliot wrote "To where Saint Mary Woolnoth kept the hours / With a dead sound on the final stroke of nine."
7. Grinling Gibbons; his original receipt for the work, in which he described it as his "Olter Pees," was rediscovered in the Guildhall Library in 1946.
8. The tetragrammaton — the name of God in Hebrew characters — surrounded by rays of light and worshipping angels.
9. Before the rebuilding of London Bridge in the 1830s the old bridge ended almost at the church's west door, meaning that for seven hundred years every person entering the City from the south passed directly past the tower, which was the first sight of the City for all travellers from Southwark.
10. He had been stuck in traffic on London Bridge without any means of knowing the time and vowed that if he prospered he would give the church a public clock for all passengers to see.
